




READ, LEARN, DISCOVER!

Kameron Steele (Valentine, Fabian) recently appeared as Christy Mahon in the Chicago Humanities Festival production of *The Playboy of the Western World*. Off and Off-Off Broadway credits include Ben in *The Dumb Waiter* (Classic Stage Company), Cassio in *Othello* (Horace Mann Theatre), Odysseus in *Penthesilea* (Juliard School/The Salon), and Frank in James Joyce's *Eveline* (Trilogy Theatre). Some regional credits include, Caliban in *The Tempest* (StageWest, MA), Simon in *Hay Fever* (Centennial Theatre Festival, CT) and most recently as Gerald in *An Inspector Calls* (Wayside Theatre, VA). Kameron has also appeared in Japan on stage and television with Tadashi Suzuki's SCOT Company as, Romeo's Ghost in *Juliet*, which toured to the '93 Saratoga International Theatre Festival



Mark Ulrich (Malvolio) has been acting with *The Shakespeare Project* since November of 1996, when he first played Don Pedro in *Much Ado About Nothing*. Since then, he has also appeared with *The Shakespeare Project* as King Edward in *Richard III*, Prince Hal in *Henry IV, part 2*, young John Talbot in *Henry VI, part 1*, and in *The Life and Death of King John* last January as well as the revival performance of *Much Ado About Nothing* in April of 1997 at the Oakton Community College. He has also performed with Organic/Touchstone Theatre, Next Act Theatre and New American Theatre, among others. Mark is currently at work on his one man show *Don Ho in Hell*.

Nancy Nickel (Director) is delighted to make her maiden voyage as a director with this particular group of actors in this particular play, one she performed in years ago and only now is



beginning to get a clue about. Such is life. She has performed in a number of other *The Shakespeare Project* presentations, most notably as Queen Elizabeth in *Richard III*, Margaret in *Henry VI, part 2*, Queen in *Richard II*, Queen Isabella in *Edward II*, Hermione in *The Winter's Tale*, Lady Macbeth in *Macbeth*, and as the Assitant Director for *Henry V* last July. As a member of the Board of Directors, she spearheads *TSP's* Education and Outreach programs. Currently, Nancy is working to complete the development of her one woman show entitled "*Second Best (the comedie and tragedie of Will Shakespeare's wife)*", a

fictionalized exploration into the life experiences of Anne Hathaway. Nancy has performed with many of the theaters in the Chicago area including National Jewish Theatre, Oak Park Festival Theatre, Illinois Theatre Center, and Shakespeare Repertory in their award-winning production of *The Tale of Cymbeline*. In her other life, she works in an advertising agency but still doesn't understand how the word "impactful" should be used in a sentence.



Mara Polster (Artistic Director/Stage Manager) is delighted that *The Shakespeare Project of Chicago* has now begun its third year presenting free public performances of the complete works of William Shakespeare. The project began in May of 1995 as a "fire in the belly" and has grown to an object of much pride and promise with little more than a tireless imagination and a love of the words (plus a brilliant Acting Company). Mara has performed on many of the stages here in Chicago and many others across the country. With *TSP*, she has played Lady Macbeth, Goneril (*King Lear*), Katherina (*Shrew*), Isabella (*Measure for Measure*), Paulina (*The Winter's Tale*) and Margaret (*3-Henry VI*) and directed *Titus Andronicus*,

Henry VIII, *Comedy of Errors* (twice), *Two Noble Kinsmen*, *Julius Caesar*, *Two Gentlemen of Verona*, *Othello*, *Loves Labours Lost*, *King Lear*, *Macbeth* (three times), *A Midsummer Nights Dream*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, *Hamlet*, *Coriolanus*, *Edward II*, *Henry V*, *Richard III* and next month *King Lear*. *The Shakespeare Project of Chicago* exists as the grateful commemoration of two fiercely strong souls, Samuel E. LaMacchia (the sower of the seed) and Michael A. Wilson.

Director's Notes


O, fellow, come, the song we had last night.
Mark it, Cesario; it is old and plain:
The spinsters and the knitters in the sun,
And the free maids that weave their thread with bones,
Do use to chant it: it is silly sooth,
And dallies with the innocence of love.
Like the old age.

The innocence of love. What a concept for this time we live in. It always seems slightly out of reach to us as to Orsino, something from an age long past. But as Shakespeare reveals scene after scene in this play, and most clearly through the deep, abiding and achingly sweet love of a pair of separated twins, despite our emotional misfires, confused desires, and mistaken intentions, love (and our sometimes pathological desire to track it down) endures and is right here, right now.

Into the topsy-turvy world of Illyria (a world of perhaps "peculiar" enchantment where servants seem to rule the roost and one man's fate may be determined by the color of his stockings), come Viola and later Sebastian, who carry an inner world of enchantment born out of their extraordinary love and deep connection. No wonder people fall in love with them! But Shakespeare, in his wisdom and with great humor, reminds us that the path to love is hardly ever a clear one and at its best is a mystery, for as Feste reflects, "Nothing that is so is so." And the path is not without its disappointments, sometimes brutal ones, for not everyone will be standing with their heart's desire when all is said and done. The play is quite bittersweet in this regard, but to me unsparingly true. There is hope and loss, but above all, the unfailing desire to connect.

What a wonderful holiday message for this old age, winding down as it is and opening up to...?

Established as a vehicle to enable Chicago's professional actors to explore great literature while working in the company

of others with like experience and interest levels, these exceptionally skilled performers have previously been seen on the stages of The Goodman Theater, Steppenwolf, Shakespeare Repertory, Northlight Theatre, The Court Theater, and many other great stages in the Chicago area and around the country.

Our 1998 Theatrical Reading Series begins next month with *King Lear*. Performances will be held at the Lincoln Park Cultural Center on Friday evening, January 16th (7:00 p.m.), at the Chicago Public Library/Harold Washington Center on Saturday, January 17th and at the Berger Park Cultural Center on Sunday, January 18th (both at 1:00 p.m.). In January we begin our 1998 Series featuring twelve of the popular favorite plays by William Shakespeare, beginning with *King Lear* and ending with *Hamlet*. All readings are free to the public.





Jason Eric Hays (Antonio, Curio) directed *Henry VI, part 3* for *The Shakespeare Project* in








